Relatives in Chicago were informed and came to Glasgow, some of whom remain at the bedside of Mrs. Kasper. The body of Mr. Kasper was returned to Illinois for burial.

Sugar means all types of cane and beet sugars in all forms, including granular, confectioners, powdered, tablet, brown and soft sugars, as well as liquid sugar, invert sugar and sugar syrup. Molasses is not included.
