Our boys are being killed on battlefields all over the world. Our soldiers need more tanks, airplanes and guns. Our steel mills have just issued a report that they are making six million tons less steel than they could have made this year because they could not get enough steel to run at full capacity. Yet on the farms of Barren County, there are thousands of pounds of scrap metal doing nobody any good. Mr. J. O. Horning, County Salvage Director, is now appealing to all citizens, as well as 4-H Clubs and all civic organizations, to hunt every piece of scrap metal and pile it up ready for markets. During the first seven months of this year, Barren County shipped more than 3-1/2 million pounds of scrap, but more is needed.

Hemp Plant Here. The "big newspapers" report that fifteen hemp processing plants may be built in Kentucky by the Government. We understand that the Barren County Farm Bureau has been active in efforts to obtain one for Glasgow, around which a considerable amount of hemp is now being grown.
