He brought it to the Museum from a barn where it had been stored for 50 years. Looms were used to weave cloth, make rugs, and/or spreads in the 1700s and 1800s. It was a slow, slow process and a long discarded form of craft work. Few looms can be found in today's fast manufacturing world.
