Attempted Assassination of President Elect Roosevelt Yesterday; Five Wounded When Assassin Fires at Franklin Delano Roosevelt. A gunman, who gave his name as Joe Zingara, of New York, was quoted as saying, "I kill all Presidents – kill every officer." Startled and momentarily stunned by the firing close to his car, Roosevelt waved to the crowd and shouted, "I am all right" as he was hurriedly driven away from the confusion. Among the five wounded was Chicago's Mayor Cernak who was speedily admitted to a nearby hospital; little hope is held for his life.

In dodging a ball, he struck the end of a pipe, cutting a gash on the right cheek and sustaining a slightly fractured cheek bone.
