Feb. 1, 1994 – The US Army Corp of Engineers will begin collecting recreation user fees for swimming beaches and boat launching ramps at many of its day use areas this year including many at Barren River Reservoir.

February 14, 1994 – Power still off for thousands as work continues to return power. Emergency shelters are set up at Hatcher and Saddler, YMCA and T J Samson Community Hospital. Also A F Crow and National Guard Armory were available but not used.

February 15, 1994 – Kentucky National Guard helps local farmers with milking chores. Schools will resume in City and County tomorrow.

February 16, 1994 – After a three day break from school following last week's ice storm, Barren County students returned to class Wednesday with a 92.8 attendance percentage.

Karen Glover was sworn in as the newest Barren County Board of Education member to fill the seat formerly held by her late husband, Greg.

February 18, 1994 – Mrs. Gail Hardin, Special Education Teacher at BCHS, has been awarded a \$1,000 mini grant by Very Special Arts of Kentucky.

February 20, 1994 – Renovations continue on the 60 year old Camp Rotary located near Temple Hill. Judge Benny Dickinson and a number of other "old scouts" have formed a group called "Rotary Scout Restoration Foundation".
