**MONDAY:** Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the Dixie Hotel in Cave City Monday night and one guest was critically injured. The blaze was discovered shortly after 7:00

p.m. when an explosion was heard in the rear of the third story.

Injured was Alvin Reider, about 48, of Henderson, who was in a room near the explosion. He was brought to Glasgow for emergency treatment and later transferred to a Louisville hospital with third degree burns and injuries. He was also reported to have jumped from the second floor to the lobby.

Fire crews from Glasgow, Horse Cave, Munfordville, and Park City were called in to assist the Cave City Fire Department in confining the fire to the one building. They remained on site throughout the night.

**TUESDAY:** Dr. Cary Hood announces the opening of his dental office in the former office location of the late Dr. William Palmore, in the Rapp Building, South Public Square. The offices have undergone extensive remodeling, enlarging, and Dr. Hood has installed all new modern equipment.

OCTOBER 1

MONDAY: An early morning fire completely destroyed the Tompkinsville Livestock Yard. Tompkinsville firemen answered the alarm at 4:23 a.m. but the blaze was already out of control.

Included in the loss was an office for the local veterinarian and a restaurant building. The yard was owned by Mr. J. Moore and the loss will amount to approximately \$50,000. Fire Chief Elmer Turner stated that an investigation would be made as to the possibilities of arson.

TUESDAY: In last Saturday's local option election held in the city limits of Bowling Green, the city became the first in the state of Kentucky to vote "wet" since 1952. The Committee for Law-and- Order recorded a 2,750 vote majority in an election that totaled the highest number of votes in the city's history.

WEDNESDAY: An expansion of the Animal Clinic Building is nearing completion to offer better and more advanced facilities for the farmers.

THURSDAY: Glasgow Fire Chief Russell "Crook" Francis received a Certificate Saturday for special recognition for his services as instructor in the annual fire school at the University of Kentucky. Also, he was recently awarded a lifetime membership in the Kentucky Firemen's Association.

FRIDAY: The demolition of the Elliot Service Station on the southeast corner of Main and Broadway, is underway to make room for expansion of the A&P Store. Also, the former building of the Busy Bee Café will be removed to complete a "Wide Look" while driving north on Broadway. The building on the southwest corner has already given way for more modern improvement.
