Ex-Slave Serves Five Generations of Hayeses. James "Foot" Woodson, 90, colored, and an ex-slave, succumbed yesterday at the home of D. G. Hayes of infirmities due to his advanced age. Woodson was a slave who had belonged to the late Col. Anthony Woodson of Munfordville and had been with the Hayes family since 1877, during which time he had served five generations of Hayeses, with whom a mutual devotion was shared. Woodson had a vivid recollection of the Civil War "Battle of Munfordville." The remains were returned to Hodgenville for burial.
