Volunteers literally swamped the local Draft Board office today and, as a result, officials expressed the belief that the contingent which will leave next Monday for the Induction Station at Louisville will be composed entirely of volunteers, as have been all previous quotas furnished from Barren County. Seven volunteers were examined today and, if all of them are accepted, they will supplement the fifteen previously examined. These volunteers include H. C. Biggers Jr, Glasgow; James Lawson Chapman, Route 1, Cave City; Wilton D., Stanley Woodrow, and Euel Houchens (three brothers), of Lamb; Louis Almond Logsdon, Route 3, Cave City; Robert Stone, Route 1, Glasgow; James Leon Ramey, Route 3, Glasgow; Gordon Turner, Route 1, Franklin; Roy Alexander, Lecta; William Emil Fant, Finney; Hurlin Green, Finney; Walter Woodrow Clark, Route 1, Glasgow; Ellis Allen Gillon, Route 2, Glasgow; and Stanford Carlton Barbour, Route 4, Glasgow.

Mr. Arthur Polson was killed instantly late Friday afternoon when lightning struck the barn on his farm near Slick Rock. He was in the loft putting feed in the trough when the lightning hit. His clothing caught fire but the blaze was extinguished by his daughter,

thus saving the barn from burning. A horse in the barn was killed by the strike. Mr. Polson is survived by his wife, two daughters and one son, as well as by four sisters and five brothers. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Slinker at Mt. Pisgah, and burial was in the Peers Cemetery.

APRIL 10, 1941

As we go to press, a report has it that Robert Wooten, brother of "Reuben "Tennessee" Wooten, was slain earlier tonight in Bowling Green. Though not confirmed, it seems that Wooten approached a man by the name of Campbell, who was unloading a truck of fruit in front of his store, and after some words had been passed, Campbell obtained a pistol and fired a shot at Wooten, striking him behind the right temple. Wooten is reported to have lived about five minutes, but his body lay on the street for an hour or so before officers would permit its removal. During that time, a crowd of several hundred people flocked to the scene. Further information was not available as we proceeded into publication.

The Reverend Dr. Joseph A. Gaines, beloved pastor emeritus of the First Baptist Church, succumbed at his home on South Green Street on Tuesday, April 8. His passing, though not unexpected, cast a pall over the entire populace of Glasgow and its environs that evidenced the saintly reverence in which he was held. Dr. Gaines had been pastor of the local Baptist Church for twelve years, but this past January, bowing to the inevitities of his physical condition, he tendered his resignation, which was at first declined but later accepted. Dr. Gaines had enjoyed numerous positions and assignments of honor in the Baptist world and had been an inspiration to various important civic organizations. This saintly man, only 52 years of age, was laid to rest on Good Friday, April 10, exactly 28 years after his ordination (also on Good Friday) to the ministry. The book is closed on a great and good man, but his life shall be long reflected in the lives and memories of this community, which is better because Joe Gaines has lived amongst us.

Army Accepts 20 More Men from Barren County. Of special significance in this group was the fact that three brothers and a cousin were included among the volunteers, but ill-luck befell the patriotic quartet following their arrival at the Induction Station when one of the brothers and the cousin were rejected on their physical examinations. They returned home that afternoon. The twenty who were accepted were forwarded to Fort Thomas that evening.

Adolphus Depp, at one time Sheriff of Barren County, died this morning at his home on Beaver Creek on the Cave City Road. He was 88 years old on January 30, having been born and reared in Metcalfe County. He was married 62 years ago to Miss Betty Bagby, who survives him with one son, Walter. Two sisters and one brother survive, as do several grandchildren and great-grandchildren. A member of the Christian Church, Mr. Depp was active in religious affairs until age and ill health prevented his leaving home. He was respected and loved by all who knew him, and his passing will be mourned by all. Funeral services will be held Friday at the Christian Church with Rev. K. H. McCorkle in charge.
